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School vision	To prepare each of our students for success in their ever changing future by providing them with the necessary skills, knowledge and general capabilities.

Context challenges	Barton Primary School (Barton PS) is a Public/Private Partnerships (PPP) school which opened on the first day of the 2017 school year. It is situated in the growth corridor of south east Melbourne in the City of Casey, five kilometres from the main street of Cranbourne and 51 kilometres from the Melbourne Central Business District.  The school currently has 702 students enrolled for the 2020 school year. There has been rapid growth in student enrolments since the school opened and this is expected to continue. Currently 65% of the student population are EAL learners. The Student Family Occupation (SFO) index was 0.4925 and the Student Family Occupation Education (SFOE) index was 0.4110.  The school currently has a staffing profile of 53.06 Equivalent Full Time (EFT). This was broken into 38.2 Teacher Class, 4.0 Principal Class, 5.46 Education Support (ES) Integration staff and 5.4 ES Administration staff. The average number of years of experience for teachers is below 3 years.
